### Head Lice

There has been an outbreak of head lice within a few classes at Nishkam Primary School.

Would you please all check your child's hair to make sure that they are clear from head lice.



How to check for head lice:

- Wash hair with usual shampoo and rinse.
- Use a larger amount of conditioner and massage into hair.
- Leave conditioner in and comb with an ordinary comb first.
- Then switch to specialist nit comb. Slot comb in flat against scalp and comb through in sections.
- Rinse or wipe comb between strokes to get rid of any lice.
- Work over whole scalp, always checking for lice.
- Once completed rinse conditioner off hair.
- If lice are detected then treat with solution. Always check with your pharmacist which lotion is currently being used.

There is nothing you can do to prevent head lice; however you can help stop them spreading by wet or dry combing regularly with a nit comb to catch them early.

- <u>Please hear your child read for at least ten</u> <u>minutes every single day.</u> Discuss what they have read, **explore** together and most importantly **enjoy** hearing them read.
- Read to your child for at least ten minutes every day. We were lucky enough to have our school councillors carry out a pupil survey and found that and overwhelming 82% of children enjoyed it. Moreover, snuggling up in pyjamas and hearing an adult read was thoroughly enjoyed by children from Reception all the way to Year 6. Yes, even Year 6! In terms of what to read; the answer is whatever interests your child. It can be novels, comic books, leaflets, newspapers, fairy tales, funny stories, information books. Your children love being read to. Our pupil survey proves it!

### Nishkam Reader – Lifetime Achiever!

Reading with your child is vital. Research shows that it's the single most important thing you can do to help your child's education. It's best to read little and often, so we would like you to try to put aside some time (20 minutes) for it every day.

Creating a regular 'special time' to read together can help children see the magical world that can be unlocked by the opening of a book, comic or magazine and learn to love the time when they have your undivided attention.

Talking about what you've just read together helps children think about what they've read, boosts their imagination and grows their confidence. It's also a good way to pick up on new words and check that they understand what they've read.

We would like your child to read aloud at home with an adult for 20 minutes every day. Once they have read, please sign and date their reading record with a brief comment about what they have read. Children will then be awarded certificates accordingly to encourage and praise their success.
