



Year 2 Truth










Year 2 Compassion

The PE team aim to improve the health, fitness and well-being of the pupils at Nishkam. We do this through providing pupils with a safe, fun learning environment. During the summer term pupils will be taking part in the following sporting activities within lessons:

> Tennis Rounders Cricket Athletics

We aim to create links within the community to create further opportunities for our pupils. We work in partnership with a number of local providers within the community. To name a few:



The FA – Through the FA Girls Partnership we are supporting the FA to ensure girls receive equal access to football. Girls in all years now experience football within the curriculum and at KS3 we have a thriving girls football club. As part of this program the school will be involved in the Women's Euros. Years 8&9 have an opportunity to become involved in an initiative called Game of Our Own. This provides opportunities for the girls to become leaders and coached within the game of football.



METTLE

Harlequins RFC have been coming into school to work with our Years 4-6 to help improve their mental well-being alongside their physical fitness. The programme encourages pupils to begin thinking about their lifestyle choices from a young age.



Dukes Meadow

We are very lucky to have tennis coaches from Dukes Meadow delivering tennis sessions to Year 3 and 4 to help improve knowledge and skills of the game of tennis.





FA Wildcats

A fantastic opportunity for girls to begin their football journey. This is run at Nishkam every Thursday and provides a warm, fun environment for girls to develop their knowledge and skills of the game. This club helps to provide a link between schools and club football for the girls. It is pleasing to see so many of the girls from Nishkam attending.

Brentford FC

They provide a free girls' football club for KS3. They are also working with our Year 5 pupils to deliver a problem called Move and Learn. This programme focusses on the effects lifestyle choices can have on our bodies from a young age.

NSWL Music Department



It has been a pleasure to see pupils return to music lessons across the school, and following lock down, music could not be of more importance.

The return to practical music-making has given pupils the opportunity to widen their school experience, and the chance to rebuild practical skills and knowledge.

At KS3, **Year 7** pupils have been focusing on gaining a solid foundation of the elements of music (pitch, dynamics, timbre, tempo) as well as increased confidence in the notes of the keyboard and reading notation. Please click

Year 8 are currently studying reggae, following from a unit on the 12 bar blues. We have been looking at primary chords I, IV, V and how chord progressions are the fundamentals of a wide range of musical styles, as well as the building blocks for songwriting.

Year 9 are currently looking at minimalism and we have been discussing "art music" as a form. This is following on from work on samba, bhangra and musical fusions (where pupils have been teaching me about Punjabi music!) We have discussed the far-reaching effect of globalization, and how musical styles have and continue to evolve by tapping into the richness of other cultures.

- Be resilient to setbacks in musical processes
- Be able to discuss and critique their own
 and other's music
- Be prepared to take creative risks
- Communicate effectively to an audience
- Be able to work both independently and collaboratively
- Be committed to music both in and out of the classroom
- Be confident in the application of music literacy
- Be inspired and motivated by musical excellence



Instrumental Lessons:

In addition to our curriculum, the music department has continued to run instrumental learning in conjunction with Hounslow Music Service. Where other schools in the Borough had completely stopped these lessons due to COVID, we weathered the storm and made a complete switch to Teams lessons over the Spring term.

Thank you to families who bought into this for their children and who continue to support their child's musical journey.




Everyone's a Reader at Nishkam


Title: Mr Penguin and the Lost Treasure Author: Alex T. Smith Recommended by: Ms Kaur Recommended for: Years 2 and 3
