Dear Parents and Carers,

It gives me great pleasure to write the final newsletter of the year and to reflect on the successes of 2024.

It has been a jam-packed half-term for our pupils, starting with learning about Diwali, Bonfire Night and Remembrance Day and ending with marvellous Christmas celebrations.

It has been a year since I have been the headteacher of Primley Wood and I am incredibly proud of the journey that the school is on, and the progress made so far. The staff team have worked relentlessly hard to make swift, well-needed changes and refinements in several areas. A year later, we are now beginning to feel and see the impact of many of the effective changes made. Here is a little snapshot of some of the successes so far...

<u>Curriculum</u>

We have redefined our curriculum and have a virtues-led offer, which ensures we focus on the holistic as well as the academic success of every child.

A progressive curriculum (including vocabulary) which starts in Nursery has been mapped out.

Arithmetic is taught daily through precision teaching and arithmetic results are tracked weekly.

We ensure teaching time is purposeful, and we maximise every opportunity to stretch our children further. Floor books have been introduced for our wider curriculum subjects.

A successful Mocksted inspection was completed.

A new writing process has been implemented, with a tight focus of different genres using high-quality texts. We have introduced a new reading strategy, aligned with the latest government guidance, which aims to support children in developing skills linked to a wide range of texts.

A new Phonics scheme – Little Wandle

EYFS - Nursery and Reception

The curriculum has been mapped out using quality key texts for our 2-year-olds and 3-year-olds, progressing into Reception.

Core texts and rhymes are planned for each age group to ensure progression.

Personal goals have been created to focus on our key virtues.

Provision areas inside are clear, inviting and well laid out.

A dramatic improvement in the learning environment.

Safeguarding

We have an action-led approach to safeguarding.

The school site is now more secure, with electronic gates.

Social media has been identified as our contextual safeguarding issue and we frequently educate children about this.

We have had successful external safeguarding audits and reviews

Safeguarding is frequently discussed in assemblies; for example, children have been taught about the different coloured lanyards that adults wear in school.

<u>Attendance</u>

Our attendance is above the national average and continues to improve.

Our persistent absence rate has reduced by half over the year.

We celebrate attendance weekly.

We have half-termly awards.

There will be opportunities for children to win amazing prizes for children who achieve 100% at the end of the year.

We take a rigorous approach to attendance, ensuring we swiftly address any concerns.

Love of reading

We have created an ethos that reading is the most important thing in school as it has an impact on access to all learning.

Frequent 'Drop Everything and Read' sessions.

'Read and snuggle' bags, containing books, hot chocolate and a class teddy are available to take home.

Whole-school reading time is held at the end of the day.

We have purchased high-quality texts for every class that are age-appropriate.

Successful book fairs have further promoted reading for pleasure.

An E-library that allows children to access books at their phonics level.

Phonics

Our Little Wandle scheme has been a huge success.

Parents have attended workshops to learn how to support their children at home.

Live lessons allow parents to see what Little Wandle looks like in action.

We had our highest ever phonics results and are on track to achieve over 90% this year.

The money in the PWPS bank account will go towards purchasing more books.

<u>Assessment</u>

Every pupil's progress and attainment in school is now tracked on a regular basis and actions are taken quickly to minimise any learning gaps.

The leadership team frequently look at pupils' books and drop into lessons.

Teachers mark work using a 'feedforward' approach, providing effective feedback to help children improve daily.

Learning environment

The whole school is much tidier. Resources across the school are better organised. The PE cupboard is tidy and well-resourced. The hall is clean and fresh. High-quality wall displays decorate our corridors and classrooms. Several areas of the school have been painted. The school site is well-maintained. The outside area has been maintained (weeds, bushes, etc removed).

Pupil voice

We have several pupil leadership teams. 'Votes for schools' has been introduced. We have a Primley Wood pupil bank account. Our School Council meets weekly. Pupil leaders meet frequently and are currently creating an assembly.

Playground

We have purchased new equipment, including a gazebo, a stage and picnic tables. Playground boxes are filled with toys for children to play with. We have more staff supervising on the playground. We have play leaders on the playground. The playground is considerably tidier.

Personal development and enrichment

Our personal development offer is very strong. We teach children about key virtues and hold frequent personal development events, such as our careers fayre, global awareness week and children's mental health day, etc. We offer a variety of clubs and have assigned a PE coach to ensure our pupils receive high-quality PE lessons.

Communication

A half-termly overview of what pupils are learning is provided. Key dates given to parents before the next half term (parent events are marked in green). A new, up-to-date website has been launched. Half-termly coffee mornings are held. We maintain an open-door policy.

Parents - we thank you for your growing support over the past year. Your kind comments and feedback has meant the world to the whole staff team. The community spirit that is growing is magical. The Friends of Primley Wood have been hugely successful, and I can't thank them enough for everything they do. Next year, it would be fantastic to see more parents joining this group; every parent is welcome.

Sit back, relax with a cup of hot chocolate and enjoy our Autumn 2 newsletter. Please make a note of all the key dates for next half-term.

We look forward to welcoming all pupils back on the 6th of January.

Nursery

It has been another exciting half term in Nursery – with lots to celebrate! We have been learning all about Diwali, Bonfire Night, Winter, Christmas, Hanukkah, and have celebrated lots of birthdays this term! We have demonstrated our virtues of kindness and compassion while learning about the different ways people celebrate special times in their lives.

We enjoyed making Diva lamps out of clay, glitter, and paint and creating some impressive firework art. We role-played a birthday picnic, using our math's skills to share food at our party and count candles on birthday cakes.



A key highlight for the children this term was the snow! Every morning, we talked about the weather and lots of the children were hoping that it would snow and oh, what fun we had with it when it came! The children were fascinated by the snow, ice and how it melted during the day. We discussed how we can keep warm and healthy in winter by wearing our coats, gloves, scarves and hats and the children went on to design their own hats and gloves.



The children helped decorate the nursery ready for Christmas! They took turns putting their decorations on the tree and used their fine motor skills to thread string onto baubles. We have looked at the colours and shapes that we usually see at Christmas time and lots of the children can confidently name 2D shapes such as a circle, triangle, rectangle and star. Together, we also made a cosy fireplace for our home corner and the children have had the chance to make stockings to hang along the fireplace.





The children loved mixing, patting and rolling all the ingredients and luckily our gingerbread men did not run away!

Reception

This half-term, Reception has been filled with lots of fun and exciting learning. We've been putting our phonic knowledge to work by writing captions and sentences, helping us become more confident writers. Our focus has been on using capital letters, finger spaces and full stops and many of us have been demonstrating the virtue of creativeness when coming up with super sentences. Lots of visitors to our school have commented on how well Reception are doing with their writing and reading which makes us all extremely proud.



In English, we enjoyed some fantastic stories, such as *The First Christmas, The Best Diwali Ever, Postman Bear* and *Mog the Cat,* which sparked our imaginations and led to some great discussions. In provision, we explored some new areas, including a Christmas post-box station where the children loved writing letters and cards to their friends. Reception also did a great job of decorating the classroom in preparation for some festive fun!

One of the highlights this term has been walking to the postbox to post our letters to Santa. We are eagerly awaiting replies and can't wait to see what he has written back to us. We are hoping that he will bring us some new toys for 2025.



In Math's, we have been exploring shapes, learning about their properties and even going on shape hunts around the classroom to find real-world examples. We discovered that Reception has lots of rectangles in the form of books, bricks, posters and tables. The children have also been focusing on their number formation, and we've come up with some excellent rhymes to help us remember how to form our numbers correctly.

In the forest, our topic was all about fire! Before heading into the forest, we discussed safety and how to stay safe around a fire. Next we went up to the forest to forage for firewood, learning all about the 'snap test!' Did you know that if you snap a stick and it's green inside, then it's too wet for a fire? To finish our topic, we built a fire, enjoyed toasting some marshmallows and listened to a story – a lovely way to end our half-term! 😊



Finally, we have been extra busy preparing for our wonderful Christmas show– practicing songs and learning our lines, which has been a great way to build confidence as we perform in front of our families and friends.

We enjoyed our Christmas dinner and had fun telling jokes and wearing our party hats.

It's been a magical and busy half term filled with lots of festive fun! We hope you have a wonderful Christmas break and see you in 2025!

Year 1

What a super half-term we had in Year 1! We have continued learning Phase 5 graphemes in Phonics and have been applying our new phonic knowledge when spelling new words. In English, we have been doing lots of writing linked to one of our favourite stories: Little Rabbit Foo Foo. We have written a narrative, letter and invitation, focusing on key skills such as using correct punctuation, adjectives and the joining word 'because'. Our stamina for writing has greatly improved and we have enjoyed sharing our work in class. Now that we are more confident in our writing, we can use our virtue of creativity to think of our own imaginative ideas.

In Maths, we have learned how to add and subtract numbers within 10, using part-whole models, number lines and counters to help improve our understanding. There has been lots of new vocabulary for us to learn and we have had time to practice solving different mathematical problems. We also explored 2D and 3D shapes and have noticed that we see shapes all around us!



Our Science topic this half-term was *Animals Including Humans: All About Animals*. We have really enjoyed learning about birds, reptiles, amphibians, mammals and fish, as well as herbivores, carnivores and omnivores. We did lots of sorting activities and had discussions about the features of animals in pairs and as a whole class. In Geography, we have been learning all about where we are in the world, before focusing on our school and local area. We loved looking at Google Earth and different maps and talked about where the UK is in relation to other countries. We have done lots of fieldwork in the playground, identifying the features of our school grounds. We then did a survey on our views of the playground before designing our own updated versions. In RE, we have explored different religions in the context of listening and expressing joy. This links to our virtues of kindness, patience and courtesy, which we focus on every day in class. We have done a wide range of activities based on why it is important to listen and how people show joy and celebrate. In Art, we have been learning about colours and colour mixing, which has been so much fun! Our PSHE topic has taught us about relaxation techniques and the importance of looking after ourselves by getting regular exercise and good quality sleep. In Computing, we have continued to use the Paintz app, this time focusing on making careful choices to create shapes and pictures. We even had a go at recreating a famous piece of artwork by Henri Matisse! Finally, in Music we learnt about dynamics and tempo, practiced singing new songs and used instruments to represent animals. Once again, I am so proud of Year 1's progress this half-term. I hope you all have a wonderful Christmas and New Year!

Year 2

Year 2 has had a fantastic, fun-filled half term! In Math's, we have been exploring 2D and 3D shapes, counting sides, edges, and vertices accurately, using our virtues of patience and understanding. We have also learned how to add and subtract 2digit numbers with and without exchanges.



In PSHE, we have been building our growth mindset! We have taken part in lots of challenging activities, including building a card house, threading beads and building a tower. We discussed how we felt before, during and after the activities. We developed a growth mindset by reframing how we approached tricky tasks. Instead of saying "I can't do this" we said, "I will try again."



In Science, Year 2 has been learning about habitats around the world and how we can protect our environment. We conducted our very own litter pick inside the school grounds! We used litter pickers and plastic gloves and managed to fill up two huge bin bags! Many children asked to do it again. Well-done, Year 2, for demonstrating your virtues of cleanliness and compassion! In P.E., we have discussed the benefits of physical activity for our health and well-being. We played lots of games and got our blood pumping! As we reflected, we discussed how happy we feel after doing these activities, as well as the importance of doing physical activity every day.



Overall, Year 2 has been so busy this half term and I am so proud of their increasing resilience towards learning and their virtue of creativity. Their passion and enthusiasm are infectious and they are true role models to others. I hope you all have a restful and fun-filled half term and I will look forward to seeing the children again in 2025! 😊

Year 3 Falcons

Year 3 has had another fantastic half-term working incredibly hard across all parts of the curriculum. The children have been captivated by our class story *'Iron Man'* by Ted Hughes. This text has proven to be an incredible stimulus resulting in wonderful writing in our English lessons. We have produced a newspaper article, a narrative and a formal letter. The children have been considering how to make appropriate vocabulary choices, practicing using their magpie journals to acquire new words and apply them creatively in their own writing. They have worked diligently to produce brilliant pieces of writing which they should be very proud of.

This half-term in Math's, we have focused on multiplication and division. The children have demonstrated the virtue of curiosity in these lessons to solve problems and work systematically to solve questions. We have been using manipulatives to help embed our learning and practice our times tables at every given opportunity.

Our Geography lessons have transported us to the Amazon Rainforest which has been fascinating! Pupils learned about the importance of the Amazon Rainforest from its biodiversity, how it provides a home for indigenous communities and how it is known as the 'lungs of the earth'. The children finished this unit by writing a letter to the President of Brazil to alert him of the impact of deforestation.

In DT, Falcons have been demonstrating the virtue of creativity by designing their own seasonal tarts. They have learnt all about fruits and vegetables that grow in different climates and how eating seasonal foods positively affects the environment. They had lots of fun developing their cutting and peeling skills and tasting different types of fruit and vegetables.



The Falcons have also spent this half term developing their physical and musical talents. They have been improving their netball and team game skills in PE, while in Music they have been creating compositions and telling stories through music.

In PSHE, we have been learning all about Health and Wellbeing, carving out time to discuss resilience, self-belief and thinking of tangible strategies to help us to feel fit and healthy. In class we have also been discovering new ways to relax and calm down, now incorporating daily 'meditation time' into our afternoons.

One of the highlights this half term has been working collaboratively to learn our own rendition of the 12 days of Christmas and decorating biscuits and Christmas decorations for the school Christmas Fayre!

We are extremely proud of how hard the children have worked this half-term. They have been a pleasure to teach, and we've had so much fun getting to know them all more as individuals. We hope they enjoy their well-deserved Christmas break and look forward to seeing them again in the New Year

Year 4 Merlins

What an amazing half term in Merlins class!

Merlin's Class has shown tremendous hard work, good behaviour, and a genuine enthusiasm for learning this half term. I am incredibly proud of everything they have achieved so far and look forward to seeing even more amazing work after Christmas.

In Science, the children have been exploring the electrifying topic of electricity. They have delved into understanding circuits and how electricity powers our everyday appliances. Their curiosity and eagerness to learn have been wonderful to witness.

In Maths, the children have shown great enthusiasm and progress in mastering multiplication and division. Their hard work and determination have been truly impressive, and they have developed a solid understanding of these essential skills.

Our Science lessons have been particularly engaging as we explored electricity. The children learned how sockets work and created circuits using batteries, bulbs, and wires. These hands-on activities sparked their curiosity and deepened their understanding of how electricity powers our world.

We have been immersed in the world of forces in Science and conducted in-class experiments. From testing the strength of magnets to exploring gravity, our young scientists have been busy discovering how forces shape our world. Our weekly visits to the library have been a highlight, fostering a love of reading among the Sparrowhawks. Each visit is an adventure, with new books and stories waiting to be discovered.

In English, we have been captivated by our class book, *Street Child*, which tells the story of a boy in Victorian London. We have created three pieces of writing – a newspaper article, a story starter and a formal letter. The Sparrowhawks have loved acting out scenes from the book, bringing history to life in our classroom as you can see here!



In PSHE, we have been exercising our mindfulness and even tried out yoga as a class. These sessions have helped us relax and focus, bringing a sense of calm to our busy days.



We were thrilled to have Cycle North visit Year 5. They worked hard with us over a week, and many of us earned certificates for our efforts. A special highlight was our virtual lesson with author Jacqueline Wilson. Her insights and stories have truly inspired our budding authors. What an amazing term it has been!

Year 5 Tawny Owls

As we wrap up this exciting term, the Year 5 Tawny Owls have shown remarkable dedication and enthusiasm across all areas

of their learning. In English, the children have delved into the world of historical fiction by reading Street Child. Through this engaging text, they have improved their writing by creating a newsletter, a story starter, and a formal letter. Their hard work has truly helped enhance their writing skills. (This is one of our pupils performing a persuasive speech, this lesson helped us to compose a compelling argument before writing a formal letter).

In Maths, the focus has been on understanding fractions, allowing the students to grasp this key concept with confidence and clarity. Our science lessons introduced the fascinating world of forces, with students exploring how they work and affect our everyday lives.

Geography lessons this term whisked us away to the Alps, as students compared local facilities

on a community walk to those found in alpine regions. This comparison broadened their understanding of different environments and cultures. The Tawny Owls also developed their physical and musical talents this term. In PE, they honed their tennis skills, while in Music, they had a fantastic time singing and learning about the blues.



We started a friendship tree for our R.E. lessons so that we could see the impact kindness has on one another:

"When I'm struggling, someone always helps me."

"Everyone in this class is kind to me." "When I'm upset, my friends comfort me."

"If I'm lonely my friends come and play with me."

During this half-term, some children also participated in Bikeability training and showcased their talents in the Christmas performance. Another highlight of the term was our virtual lesson with the renowned author Jacqueline Wilson, which inspired and motivated the children immensely. Throughout all these activities, the Tawny Owls demonstrated our school virtues, showing respect,



responsibility and kindness at every turn. We are proud of their achievements and look forward to another successful term ahead!

Year 6 Redkites


In Year 6, we have had an incredibly productive half term!

Our main book this term has been the novel 'Wonder'. This book explores virtues such as acceptance, forgiveness and compassion. The children have shown a really keen interest in this book with many choosing to read it independently alongside our studies. Due to the enthusiasm of the children, we have based various pieces of work around the text including a narrative from the perspective of August as well as a newspaper report based on his joining of school. Throughout both pieces, children showed a great level of understanding and produced some excellent work. Throughout their writing and book study, the children have shown a great level of the virtue of compassion not just for Auggie (the main character) but all those affected by the theme of difference within the narrative.

To further curate a love and understanding for the text, the children undertook some role play and acted out various scenes from the novel. This was a brilliant display of the virtue of creativity on the part of the children as they worked brilliantly to show the characters' feelings in the way in which they performed.



The children have also been working hard within their Maths. Throughout this half-term, the focus has been on fractions. Children have been taught how to find fractions of amounts, multiply and divide fractions by integers, multiply a pair of fractions alongside thorough arithmetic testing and practice. The children have risen to the challenge and have produced some incredible work.



In our afternoon sessions, the children have been learning a wide range of different subjects ranging from how global population has changed over time to studying the value of prayer and unity within R.E. Within D.T, we have been focusing on food and its importance within culture! The children were encouraged to bring in some of their favourite recipes from home.



After we had looked over a variety of recipes, we decided that it was time for us to do some cooking of our own. We settled on our main ingredient and decided that we were going to create some stuffed peppers! We looked at some instructional videos to make sure that we were completely prepared and could use the equipment safely. We spoke at length about some of the flavour profiles we wanted to create and cast our minds back to the start of the term where we conducted our very own tasting session. The peppers were a great success!



Overall, the second autumn term has been a successful one! It finally concluded in our own performance of 'Bad Guys' from the musical 'Bugsy Malone' which the children greatly enjoyed. The children deserve a good rest over the Christmas period to recharge their batteries and I hope that you have a fantastic new year.

Children in Need

This term, we celebrated Children in Need by coming to school dressed in spots, stripes, or non-uniform. We spent time learning what Children in Need is and about all the amazing work that the charity does to support young people.
